Teaching and Learning

Teaching and learning arrangements for the Academic Year 2020-21

Our core aim is to make a gradual and partial return to face-to-face (f2f) teaching. However, in recognition of the continued challenges student may face with international travel and quarantine throughout the summer, the University will support students who decide not to travel to Hong Kong for Semester 1 studies by providing a hybrid mode of teaching and learning, ie: face-to-face and online teaching will be conducted throughout the semester.

UG and TPG students who are in Hong Kong will be expected to come to campus for required f2f classes. They may choose to participate in non-required course components (often lectures are in this category) either f2f or online. But for required course components in which attendance is checked (small-group work is typically in this category) they will be expected to come to campus.

UG and TPG students who are not in Hong Kong will have the choice of taking their courses online. We will not be able to provide an exactly equivalent experience in all cases, since some elements of our teaching, such as laboratories, studios and clinical work, cannot easily be moved online. Nevertheless, we will do our best to support the learning of students who are not in Hong Kong.

Final examinations will take place online, unless all the students taking a course are in Hong Kong. In those cases only, the final examination will take place in person in an examination hall on campus.

Parameters

The broad parameters we will observe for teaching are listed below. Where circumstances allow, there may be variation within individual programmes.

- Small-group classes (up to 25 students) will be scheduled as normal.
- Lectures will be scheduled in classrooms that can accommodate at least twice as many students as are in the class. Thus, a lecture with 60 students will be scheduled in a classroom that can accommodate at least 120 students.
- For UG programme courses, our available teaching rooms will enable us to deliver f2f lectures for almost all classes of up to 90 students.
- For UG Common Core courses, our available teaching rooms will enable us to deliver f2f lectures for roughly half of our courses with 120 students.
- The Grand Hall will enable us to schedule a small number of large lectures (up to 300 students) for TPG and UG students.
- However, most courses with more than 90 students will deliver their lectures online.

classrooms and Faculty/departmental spaces used for face-to-face meetings. The University is currently implementing the following measures:

- (a) Any individual with symptoms such as fever or cough should not come to the campus. Anyone developing symptoms on campus should seek medical assistance immediately. The University has already provided non-contact IR thermometers to departments/units that wish to perform indoor checking of body temperature.
- (b) All persons should perform hand hygiene properly, especially after touching potentially contaminated or high-use surfaces. Departments/units should make alcohol-based handrub available for use in classrooms and other venues where face-to-face meetings take place, and can contact the Safety Office to obtain handrub if needed.
- (c) The University will continue enhanced cleaning of frequently touched surfaces in common facilities such as lifts and escalators. Departments/units should make similar arrangements within their offices/areas.
- (d) Mask wearing on campus is strongly encouraged. In particular, all persons should wear a mask in classrooms, shared/common study spaces, meeting rooms, and any other venues where appropriate physical distancing cannot be maintained. It is recognized that mask wearing is not possible when eating or drinking and that in outdoor spaces, discretion may be used.
- (e) No eating or drinking is allowed in the classrooms.
- (f) When classes exceed 25 students, seating arrangement (including an alternate seating) should be done in a way to facilitate appropriate physical distancing.
- (g) Individual campus facilities may implement additional infection prevention measures as applicable. Since public health is a shared responsibility, the University strongly urges everyone to observe these guidelines. The University will continue to review the situation and make the necessary adjustments. Please check with the COVID-19 INFO HUB on the University Main Page for services update.
